Highlights of the General Meeting - August 30, 2017

Only a little over a week until our next Honor Flight -- Saturday, September 9 out of Fort Lauderdale -- with 27 World War II veterans and 45 Korean War veterans, each accompanied by a Vietnam veteran as an Elite Guardian.

PLATOON 9917: That's the official name for our 72 Elite Guardians flying on 9-9-17. This is a very unique flight with the bonding of three military generations. We are the only hub to have Vietnam veterans serving as the full corps of guardians on a flight. Several guardians, including one who enlisted in the Marines at 15, were in attendance at perhaps our best-attended meeting ever. Tommy Matteo, who received six Purple Hearts, will again serve as ambassador for the Vietnam veterans. Allegiant Flight 1941 will depart Fort Lauderdale at 6:30 a.m. for Baltimore-Washington International. The four buses will head directly to Arlington National Cemetery for the Changing of the Guard, and then on to the World War II and Korean War memorials and the Vietnam Wall before returning to FLL for the big homecoming celebration. Thirty-five soldiers from Fort Meade will be assisting again. This has become such a popular day for the active-duty troops that many have participated several times and there is a competition to see who will get to join us this time.

HOMECOMING: This is a night you won't want to miss. With so many veterans, this homecoming is likely to be the most exciting, emotional ever. Start inviting your friends. It's a great night for families and the veterans always enjoy seeing all the children. There will be entertainment while waiting for Flight 1945, which is scheduled to arrive at Terminal 2 at 8:30. GROUND CREWS: "Yellow shirt" volunteers will be scheduled to arrive at 4 a.m. at FLL Terminal 2. As always, the goal is to make the veterans as comfortable as possible while keeping the boarding process moving. At night, volunteers should arrive at 6:30 to hang posters, set up the parade route and greet all our supporters. And remember after the parade, there is still plenty of work -- cleaning up the terminal and assisting at the curb until the last veteran is picked up. Volunteer assignments will be sent out next week. ... Parking will be provided for volunteers scheduled to work. Take a ticket as you enter the Palm Garage. DO NOT drive through the SunPass lane. You will not be reimbursed for a SunPass charge.

MAIL CALL: Thanks to Carol and Bob Filoramo for again hosting the early mail call sorting. Final sorting will be at next Wednesday's meeting. Mike Miskew said there is a decent amount of mail arriving. With school just resuming, there is little generic mail from students. If you would like to write letters to veterans, please bring them next Wednesday. The more letters the better.

HONOR FLIGHT GALA: The formal military gala -- October 14 at Rick Case Arena at Nova Southeastern University, Davie -- will be the biggest event ever for Honor Flight South Florida. Fundraising chairman Stan Bostic said all the entertainment has been confirmed. Travel expenses are the only fees for the speakers and entertainers and there is no charge for use of the arena. Still, Stan pleaded for more help, saying "the gala has to be a huge fundraiser" to keep our flight plans ambitious again in 2018. If all sponsorships and tables are sold, there is a potential of making \$200,000, Stan said. There will be radio and TV coverage promoting the gala.

HOW YOU CAN HELP: Chairman Rick Asper challenged everyone to get involved and do what ever they can to make the gala a big success. So what can you do? Start by telling your friends. Invite them to join you -- tickets are \$150 for the full gala, \$1,500 for a table of 10; \$35 for tickets for entertainment only. The big key is selling sponsorships, starting at \$5,000.
